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Unit Spotlights

Hosting Exchange Student– Rodrigo Fernandez Ruiz

One of our Hiawatha District Scoutmasters, Ronda Marshall with Troop 82 Girls and Troop 82 Boys, is a Host Parent to 15-year-old foreign exchange student, Rodrigo Fernandez Ruiz, from Madrid, Spain. Not only has Rodrigo joined Troop 82 Scouts during his school year here in the USA, but he is also a member of Scouts in his home country. I interviewed Rodrigo on November 4, 2024, about his experiences so far as an exchange student and in Scouting.

Pam: Rodrigo, tell me about you and your family and your hobbies.

Rodrigo: I'm the middle son of a family of five and I have 2 sisters and my parents. We live in a good house with a garden, which is not usual because most people live in apartments. One of my sisters is in University and the other is in High School. In Spain I am busy with Scouts and basketball and I like to hang out with friends and go to DJ dances. My family has family time on Sundays and every summer I look forward to vacation time at my grandparents' home in Malaga by the Mediterranean Sea. My favorite memories of my time spent in Malaga is the Fair there: dancing in the streets, eating the typical foods and drinks and seeing the street attractions.

Pam: What guided you to trying the exchange student program?

Rodrigo: My sister went first in the program and lived with a family in Idaho, USA. She said she had lots of fun there and liked learning about new cultures and traveling in the USA.

Pam: I hear you are enrolled in Scouts in Spain. How does it work there?

Rodrigo: Scouts are divided into 5 different sections by age:

Castores - Beaver Scouts: Ages 6-8 Lobatos - Cub Scouts: Ages 8-11 Rangers - Scouts: Ages 11-14 Pioneros - Senior Scouts: Ages 14-16 **Rutas** - Rover Scouts: Ages 16-21-similar to USA youth leadership development

I started Scouts in the first year of Lobatos and now I'm in my first year of Pioneros. We have a campout each month and every week we hang out to do things. We have no ranks; we advance by age. I've noticed the skills that are learned and demonstrated are similar between the USA and Spain. Summer camp is a big event. We do it in stages: We Go, We Ride, and We have Ceremony. For the Go, we go to an open field and set up the camp. We lash together our latrine and shower house and set up the big tent for the dining hall and commissary. The Ride is a 4day backpacking walk or hike. And we have ceremonies, some secret, some around totems and some by trial (example is jumping into river blindfolded).

Pam: What have you noticed about Scouting in USA compared to Scouting in Spain?

Rodrigo: I like that the group size is smaller and that there is more coordination and organization [structure] in the USA. I do not like, as much, the bigger age ranges here and being around the younger Scouts. But I was challenged by Troop 82 Senior Patrol Leader Ryan to (continued on page 4)

lead the little ones in an activity, and I found it was more



fun to help them and get to know them better.

Pam: What have you learned already and what do you hope to gain from your exchange student experi-

ence here?

Rodrigo: I have found the culture to be very different. In the USA families do everything together and every month there is a holiday that people gather for.

In Spain we have 4 big holidays:

- Palm Sunday to Easter for celebration of Christ's life and death
- Christmas to New Years-every church puts up a big Nativity, 3 Wise Men morning celebration, 31st & 1st celebrations for the end of a year and beginning of new one
- Fair (summer celebrations)
- Military holiday

I like that people to be more friendly and open here and that families spend more time together.

Pam: Do you recommend the US students try the foreign exchange program?

Rodrigo: Yes! You learn lots of things, experience different cultures, and meet new people.

Brody from pack 59 in Zumbrota wanted the Scout Life Patch. To do that he needed to get a joke published in the "Scout Life Magazine".



Remembering Past Scouters

Remembering, Ronald Schultz

June 24, 1969-August 18, 2024 -Lewiston,

A long time Scouter from Lewiston, Ron Schultz, passed from our presence on August 18th of this year just after his 55th birthday. From the moment his sons, Zach and Josh, were eligible for Scouts, Ron became an active adult leader with Lewiston Pack 16 and Troop 18, often doing double duty between the Units. He loyally served 13 years with the Pack and Troop and his memories will live on in the youth and leaders of the Lewiston Scouting community. His wife of almost 23 years Jennifer Schultz agreed to an interview about Ron and his Scouting career, and current Pack 16 Cubmaster Darien Heimermann shared his thoughts about Ron as well.

Pam: I see from Ron's obituary that he was famous for his Dad jokes and movie quotes. What do you remember as his favorite ones?

Jennifer: For a Dad joke memory, the kids would say, "I'm going to take a shower" and Ron's response would be, "smells like a good idea." We would



typically groan. And a movie quote he would say, "We're going to need a bigger boat" from Jaws, one of his favorite movies. These and other strange facts that Ron knew are what connected him to people. He was our game show "life line" for knowing facts.

Darien: I remember when Ron and I worked on a Den Adventure activity about logic thinking and Ron told the story, "You're the bus driver and at your first stop 2 people get on, at the next stop 3 get off, and at the next stop 5 get on. What color was the bus driver's eyes?" You could see the Scouts trying to keep track of the numbers so they could figure out the answer and not remembering the first line of the story, "you are the bus driver" to use that to answer the final question.

I remember football seasons. Ron was a diehard Packers fan and liked to poke fun at the Vikings. When the 2 teams would match up, he would say, "It's just the Vikings-no worries there."



Pam: Why Scouting?

Jennifer: Ron wanted to find ways to do stuff with the kids [Zach and Josh] and he loved hanging out with them and their friends. He knew the value of time spent with the kids and I think he got so much out of it, probably more than the kids. Ron had been a Cub Scout and his mother was his Den Mom. Zach and Josh can now look back at these special moments and memories of their Dad from their scouting experience together.

Scouting was big for both of us. It was great to be a part of Zach's Eagle ceremony [2022] and see his growth from the beginning to the end of his time in Scouting. It's important to me that Josh stay in Troop 18 so he can connect with the leaders that knew and worked with Ron so they can share their stories about Ron with Josh.

Darien: I remember Ron's laughter and fun. We started together as Tiger Den Coleaders and we stuck together for many years in the Pack and Troop. I could always count on his helping hand. He would be the first one there to set up Pack meetings and the last one to leave. He brought activities and prizes to our combined Pack & Troop Halloween parties and was a willing helper at Lewiston Heartland Days.

Pam: Ron will be missed but his stories will live on! Gamehaven Council will be honoring his 15 years of Scouting time with a posthumous Veteran Award.

Troop 18- Camping in the Ozarks

Troop 18 of Lewiston, Shares their Summer Camp Story

Troop 18 of Lewiston, MN, has a goal of never visiting the same summer camp twice. They haven't always been true to that mission, especially during the pandemic, but have stayed pretty consistent with their inconsistency. Last summer, they decided to visit Lake of the Ozarks Scout Reservation in Gravois Mills, Missouri. Lake of the Ozarks is run by Great Rivers Council, and has been running program for over 50 years. We recently sat down with the youth of Troop 18 to learn about their favorite memories at this exotic Scout Camp.





"Thursday Night at camp we had a night hike that the entire camp could sign up for, but only about twenty people went. Since the camp is on a hill above the lake, we had to hike down this pretty trail and watched the sunset the whole way. It is a very steep hill, so you had to watch your footing very carefully. About halfway down the staff shows you a cave in the side of the hill where the sunset lights up the entire cave when it reaches a certain point, it was very cool. On the way back up, we got to look at some constellations." -**Emmett**

"Going to Lake of the Ozarks was the first time I had ever played Water Polo, or slept for a whole camp in a hammock. I think the weather there was better for hammocking because it was less humid than Minnesota, and there were way less bugs to annoy you." -Jonah

"I loved Chess Merit Badge, and not just because I like chess, but

because I like merit badges! I met a lot of people who I still play chess with online via chess.com. The chess tournament was crazy. Before it started, I was teaching a new Scout some advanced chess maneuvers, then he used them against me and beat me." -Eddie

"The chess tournament was super fun. I did really well but took, like, eight centuries to make my move. I was definitely the slowest player there. Eddie really helped me learn new strategies to play better. Also, the staff at camp – not just at the chess tournament – were super awesome. They were really good teachers, and led fun campfires. Did you know that the reason Lake of the Ozarks Scout Camp is there is because of a robbery?" -Leo



"Archery was the most fun merit badge I took. Lake of the Ozarks was my first time shooting a bow and arrow. Their range is



really nice, though it's a little far away, but you get to shoot at targets on the side of the bluff. I wasn't very good to start with, but I got a lot better because their staff really helped coach me." **-Josh**

"I really liked hanging out with the neighboring Scouts BSA Troop for young women – Troop 4475 from Columbia, Missouri. They brought 33 young women to camp, so it was nice to learn from other Scouts what it was like to be in their troop. They all wore the same Class B shirt every day, and their Scoutmaster was very picky about having them wear the right green pants every day. They also had fancy big tents that four or more girls slept in at the same time. But we had a lot of fun hanging out and talking about Scouts. Also, the sunsets were really pretty reflecting on the lake" -**Rosie** (Troop 0004, Winona, attended as a lone scout)
